Required Texts

Course Description and Objectives

This advanced course studies theories of digital rhetorics and asks you to read and think critically about a range of relevant issues, from the practical (information architecture, design, content strategy, usability, and so on) to the ethical (privacy/obscure, online aggression, artificial intelligence, identity and power, accessibility, and so on). You will create in and analyze digital genres from a design justice perspective while considering how they can be used for advocacy, activism, and other forms of social justice work. Students willing to learn will have a successful semester even if they do not have extensive background experience in technology and/or digital design.

The objectives for this course are to

- Interrogate relationships between technology, identity, culture, and power and how individuals and communities enact (and are perceived in relation to) digital rhetorical skills and practices,
- Understand how biases in technology development teams marginalize and exclude users,
- Identify avenues for resistance to the former while promoting diversity, inclusion, equity, and access in technology development,
- Develop your understanding of digital rhetorics and corresponding principles, practices, and research, and use this knowledge to produce rhetorically effective texts,
- Gain familiarity and experience with a range of tools to produce digital materials.

Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGSS)

This course counts as an elective toward the WGSS minor and Graduate Certificate.

- [WGS minor](#) requires four core course (WGS 120; ENG 160 or 260 or 261 or 360; PHIL 246; and HIS 261 or 262) and three electives.
- [Queer Studies Concentration](#) requires three core courses (WGS 120; WGS 292; and WGS 392) and one elective.
- [WGS Graduate Certificate](#) requires one core course (WGS 490 or ENG 460) and three electives.

Brief Assignment Descriptions

The assignments in this course are designed to meet the course objectives outlined above. Below are brief descriptions of the assignments; full prompts are available on Reggienet.

Coded Bio

To show off your new HTML + CSS skills, code a brief bio of yourself as a student and human.

Attendance/Participation

Arrive to class on time. Complete readings. Engage in all activities and discussions.

Tech Time (Undergraduate Only)

Undergraduate students will present a technology and explain how it works while applying theories and concepts learned in class.

Class Facilitation (Graduate Only)

Graduate students will facilitate for 45 minutes. This can include a lecture and discussion, small group work, mini workshop, etc.

Interface Analysis & Redesign

Analyze and redesign a digital interface. Consider the shortcomings your analysis revealed, as well as the values you think the interface should embody. Produce a redesign that is more inclusive of a variety of identities.

Coded Portfolio

This portfolio will include several artifacts:

- A homepage
- Your interface analysis and redesign
- Two additional pages of your
